Farewell to Osmo Vänskä, An Epic 19 Years

In 2003, I stood before 200 Finns, Finnish-Americans, and friends at a gala reception and officially welcomed Osmo Vänskä to Minneapolis as music director of the Minnesota Orchestra. Nineteen years later, on June 3, 2022, at a farewell reception at Orchestra Hall hosted by Honorary Consul Elaine Kumpula and Finlandia Foundation National, I officially and reluctantly bid him farewell on behalf of our Finnish and Finnish-American community.

The June 3 celebration at Orchestra Hall was a multievent evening, including a "showcase" reception, the orchestra concert, and a post-concert reception.

The Twin Cities "Showcase" featured more than a dozen Finnish organizations and interests, and was sponsored by the Minnesota Trade Office, following a two-day Team Finland meeting led by Consul General Mika Koskinen from New York and including several trade officers. At the showcase, they mingled with the more than 100 people from the Twin Cities Finnish community.

Ambassador Koskinen stepped in for Ambassador Mikko Hautala, who was detained in Washington for political discussions. During the concert, which was live-streamed, Ambassador Koskinen gave official greetings and tribute to Maestro Vänskä.

A poignant part of the concert program was the tribute paid to musician and composer Jaakko Kuusisto, Osmo Vänskä's close friend, whose newly composed symphony enjoyed its world premiere that evening. Following the tragic death of Jaakko to brain cancer four months earlier, the symphony was edited and completed for performance by Jaakko's brother, violinist Pekka Kuusisto. Pekka, his wife Anna-Liina, and Jaakko's widow Maija all traveled from Finland for this special evening.

For many of us, the special moment of that evening came with Osmo's surprise when a flash mob from the Suomi Finland 100 Chorus, led by Eeva Savolainen, began singing Sibelius' anthem, *Finlandia*, throughout the crowded main lobby. International Institute of Minnesota to Begin Reimagining the Future of the Festival of Nations

August 12, 2022—The International Institute of Minnesota announced today that the Festival of Nations will not take place in 2023 to allow the Institute to launch a process that reimagines the future of the Festival of Nations.

"Since 1932 it has been an honor for the Institute to host the Festival of Nations and work with so many volunteers and community members. So much has changed during that time, especially in the last few years," said Jane Graupman, executive director of the International Institute of Minnesota. "Now is the appropriate time for the Festival of Nations to explore the new creative opportunities that exist within our community that will enhance this joyful annual event."

With respect and admiration for all that the Festival of Nations has accomplished over the past 90 years, the Institute will begin the process of reimagining how the Festival continues to celebrate all of the cultures in our state. The Institute and Festival leaders will start by exploring new ways to grow this event through new partnerships, community input and the experience of committed Festival volunteers.

Since the last Festival of Nations in 2019, the urgency and needs of Minnesota's newly arrived refugee and immigrant communities has only grown. As a leading sponsor of refugee resettlement in Minnesota, the Institute is currently responding to the recent arrival of Ukrainians seeking refuge in Minnesota. This response follows the resettlement of people from Afghanistan earlier this year—representing more than four times the number of refugees served last year. With the urgency of the global refugee crisis, the need for the Institute's leadership continues to grow. These growing and urgent priorities magnify the need to take time to reimagine the Festival of Nations.


Midsummer's Eve Cokato, Minnesota—June 25, 2022

Sisu Environmental School Update

Due to circumstances beyond its control, the Board of Directors of Sisu Environmental School made the difficult decision to postpone the opening of the school until September 2023. We faced many of the same challenges start-ups experienced over these last two difficult years, including funding delays, transportation shortages and supply-chain issues.

The board decided that more time was needed to have all the structures, processes and resources firmly in place for our students and their families. Our partners in Finland, New Nordic Schools, support this decision and we look forward to working with them over the next year to create a school that offers "A Finnish-style education for Minnesota kids."

The plan for the location for Sisu is still to be in St. Paul's Highland Park neighborhood, serving grades K–5 to start and adding a grade through 8 each year. While we won't be able to occupy the building until next spring, the founders of Sisu will continue to build relationships with our supporters by hosting informational and social gatherings at other locations throughout the year to answer questions about Sisu Environmental School and build our school community. The first of these will be on October 1 at Crosby Regional Park picnic shelter, so please feel free to join us for some fresh air and fireside refreshments with the mighty Mississippi just a short walk away.
