Sara Pajunen is a violinist, sound artist and composer who has received music degrees in both the United States and Finland and holds a Master of Music in Contemporary Improvisation from New England Conservatory (Boston). Centering projects on themes of culture, immigration, home and progress, she has released six folk-inspired albums connected to her Finnish ancestry—including the most recent 'Aallotar' recording (with Finnish accordionist Teija Niku) on German label *Nordic Notes*. In 2018, Pajunen



launched *Mine Songs*, a long-term project that uses field recordings, archival material, improvisation and image to explore the altered landscape of Minnesota's Mesabi Iron Range, her childhood and ancestral home. She was the 2015–16 Finlandia Foundation Performer of the Year, has received funding from Jerome Foundation, the Minnesota State Arts Board, Koneen Säätiö, the Arts Council of Finland, and American Scandinavian Foundation, amongst others.

From Toveritar to Today

Lotta Leiwo, Doctoral student in History and Cultural Heritage, University of Helsinki

"From 'Toveritar' to Today: Exploring Climate Narratives in Finnish-American History"

Lotta Leiwo presented findings from her research studying how Minnesota's Finnish immigrant Socialist women and their children in the 1930s conceived of weather and nature elements they experienced. Through review of little more than a decade of issues of "Toveritar," the Finnish Socialist women's magazine, Leiwo read how they wrote about nature and weather in the new world and the effects of these on their culture and work.

The presentation was organized by IHRCA, and cosponsored by Finlandia Foundation Twin Cities/Finnish American Cultural Activities, and the University of Minnesota Finnish Studies Program.

Whistles, Cracks, Hisses: The Noises of the Northern Lights

Study finds some strong auroras are accompanied by noises from changes in the atmosphere.

Data gathered in Finland shows that under the right weather conditions, auroras can be accompanied by a noise.

You may have seen the shimmering greens and pinks of the aurora borealis lighting up the night sky, but have you ever heard them? Rare reports of crackling and whooshing noises accompanying auroras have traditionally been dismissed by scientists as folklore, but data gathered in Finland has shown that under the right weather conditions, auroras can be accompanied by a noise.

The northern (and southern) lights are caused by solar particles colliding with gas molecules in Earth's upper atmosphere. They tend to be visible near the poles because the charged particles are steered towards the poles by Earth's magnetic field. But most aurora take place well out of earshot, about 62 miles (100km) above our heads.

In an attempt to lay the question to rest, scientists set up recording equipment in the Finnish village of Fiskars and listened to the night sky. Most of the time the auroras were silent, but to their surprise they found that about five percent of the strongest auroras were associated with whistles, cracks and hisses. The researchers found that the noises always coincided with a temperature inversion (cold air trapped under a lid of warm air) and appear to be caused by the release of static charge, linked to changes in atmospheric electricity caused by the aurora's disturbance to Earth's magnetic field.

Harlan Ray Stoehr, age 95, of North Oaks, Minnesota, and formerly of Shoreview, died September 3, 2024, following complications from a Covid infection in November 2022. He was a long-time FACA member and onetime board member, and FACA secretary in 2011 and 2012.



Harlan was born at Ridgeway, Minnesota, on February 4, 1929, and was raised on farms in Winona and Olmsted counties. He served in the United States Marine Corps 1951-54 (Korea 52-54, Japan 53-54). On October 1, 2024 the Finnish-American Chamber of Commerce—Minnesota (FACC-MN) hosted a Nordic Networking Event for Young Professionals. The event was generously supported by Finlandia Foundation National and held at the American Swedish Institute in Minneapolis. Other support was provided by Global Minnesota and Norway House and its BARN program. This event brought the Nordic business community together, allowing a select number of Finnish and other Nordic companies, and companies with Nordic ties, to tell the audience about their business and opportunities for early-career professionals and students interested in possible internships.
