

Sara Pajunen at the Danish American Center

On a crisp evening at the American Danish Center, the Finnish American Association hosted a performance by Sara Pajunen, a celebrated musician known for her mastery of Finnish folk music. The intimate setting provided the perfect backdrop for an evening steeped in cultural heritage and beautiful folk tales.

Sara, a classically trained violinist and composer from the Iron Range, has garnered a reputation as a respected interpreter of Finnish music. Her career is a testament to her commitment to preserving and reimagining traditional Finnish sounds. Sara has explored the deep connection of ancestral roots and the experience of current American culture as it relates to Nordic folk music. Kauneimmat Joululaulut— **Singing the Favorite Finnish Carols**

On December 7, about 150 people in the Finnish and wider community joined together at St. Michael's Lutheran Church in Roseville for the annual sing-along of beloved old and new Finnish and other Christmas carols. While most songs were sung in Finnish, some were sung in English translation from the recently published *Finnish Heritage Hymnbook*, along with other familiar carols. Guest violinist Sara Pajunen added special music to the piano and singing.



Afterwards, everyone enjoyed time for coffee and *pulla* (cardamom bread), and shopped for Finnish foods and handcrafted items in the Christmas *tori*, or marketplace.

The *Kauneimmat Joululaulut* (Beautiful Christmas Songs) program was begun in 1973 by the Finnish Mission Society, and now is sung between Advent and Epiphany by more than one million Finns in churches and other locations in Finland as well as internationally, where it has become popular among Finns living abroad. The traditional collection taken provides important support to global projects that help needy children. Song booklets printed each year are provided for all churches and are sent abroad.

"Fire and Light" Art Exhibit

"Fire and Light" exhibit at the art gallery in A-Mill Lofts in Minneapolis features nine artists, connected to the Twin Cities Nordic community, five of whom are active members of FACA. The exhibit was organized by long time FACA member Elizabeth "Helvi" Brauer of Luumu-Finnish Living who drew together artists interested in Nordic themes such as forests, water and nature. "Fire and Light" includes diverse works including painting, textiles, photography, poetry, and ceramics. The exhibit runs through the end of January.

Anni Dahl's wheel thrown and hand-built ceramics include works that evoke earth and the forest, and two raku pieces titled "Frost From Flame" and "Ignition."

Brian Kays' luminous photographs include a stark and sun-drenched view of a red building standing on a rocky outcropping in the Faroe islands.

Cami Andersen exhibits four cross-stitched pieces including an imposing and elaborate embroidery based on a William Morris inspired design of scrolling leaves and flowers.

Eeva Räisänen expressive paintings show confident loose brushwork. Her work "Horse" shows a copperytoned Sorrel horse turning its head against a wintery sky.

Elizabeth Brauer's work on paper "She burned the letters" is a hand-typed poem on the theme of "Fire and Light", with a burnt diagonal edge that underscores the poetic theme.

Liisa Lê's landscape paintings, with cranes, are detailed and realistic; additionally there are a group of masterful ink drawings of cranes installed under the staircase.

Mandy Pedigo's hand-woven wall hanging integrates colors from the forest, earth and sky into a harmonious composition with a strong diagonal design.

Michelle Ranta's oil pastoral painting focuses on scenes from nature with great attention to atmosphere and depth, and a beautiful rendition of foliage and water.

Sarah Stengle's drawings and artists' books include three works titled "Kindling Thief" inspired by birch trees injured by campers.

Is Sauna Therapy Built Into Our Genes?

Science is finally catching up and starting to figure out why and how saunas do their magic.

Could a regular sauna save or lengthen your life? Is it more than just enjoyable warmth during these brutally cold winter months?

The contemporary sauna craze may seem like a new phenomenon, but in reality, the origins of saunas stretch back at least a staggering 10,000 years. These ancient spaces, often called pit saunas, consisted of a simple pit dug into the ground with a pile of stones at its core, heated by a campfire. Once those stones reached the right temperature, the pit was covered with materials like wattle, thatch, or peat, and water was splashed on the stones to create rejuvenating steam.

Interestingly, early sweat houses similar to saunas have been discovered across Europe and Asia, dating back to the Bronze Age. Saunas and sweat lodges also held significance in ancient Islamic cultures and indigenous societies in Mexico and North America. According to a study from Harvard University, Native American sweat lodge traditions involved intricate ceremonies and rituals focused on preparation, prayer, and purification.

Meanwhile, in Japan, natural caves were initially utilized as sweat baths, eventually evolving into bathhouses situated near temples and monasteries, as beautifully explained by Emma O'Kelly in her book, *Sauna—The Power of Deep Heat*.

O'Kelly explains how ancient Finns, akin to Native Americans, revered the four elements—air, water, fire, earth—within the confines of the sauna. It represents a microcosm of the three realms of the universe: the celestial realm, the earthly world, and the underworld of the departed. The symbolism mirrors the cycles of growth, interconnection, and symbiosis, all with the aim of achieving altered states, heightened consciousness, and rejuvenation.

In Finland, this sauna mythology found its place in the *Kalevala*, Finland's epic poetry work, and Finnish runic songs. These ancient tales infused the sauna with profound symbolism, so much so that it's not uncommon to spot the gods and goddesses of the Kalevala carved into sauna doors and windows.

Laskiainen—Finnish Flavors and Fun in the Northwoods

In the late 1800's through the early twentieth century thousands of Finnish immigrants settled in Northeastern Minnesota to work in the area's iron mines. With a landscape much like Finland, immigrants felt at home amidst the expansive forests and wild cranberry bogs. From farmsteads to cultural festivals, the legacy of those early Finnish immigrants left a lasting effect. Remnants of old Finnish barns can still be seen dotted along the highways, and local festivals preserve traditions by showcasing an array of ethnic foods and lively folk music.

There is an annual Finnish sliding festival in Palo called *Laskiainen*. Held in early February, *Laskiainen* celebrates the new year and features live Finnish folk music, traditional foods, a craft fair and a Finnish museum, among other festivities. The main event, is an alarmingly steep hill that sends sledders zooming down a hill and onto an ice-covered lake. Sledders are encouraged to chant or sing for good luck in the year ahead; tradition states that the farther one slides, the more abundant the upcoming year's crop will be.

Laskiainen attendees can also enjoy traditional Finnish fare such as mojakka (a hearty beef and vegetable stew), kropsua (oven pancakes) and ilmapuuro (a cranberry pudding). A full calendar of activities include community meals dedicated to these hearty dishes. Throughout the festival you'll also find the prominent Finnish staple, pulla, a cardamom-scented bread that is most often baked around holidays and other celebratory events.
