Record-Breaking Day for Juhannus

Finnish organizations in Minneapolis/St. Paul called on *Heikki Lunta* to cool off the Juhannus Celebration on Saturday, June 21. It didn't work. Extreme heat warnings, high humidity, and 96° on the thermometer blasted the 1910 temperature record for the day. The heat didn't stop more than 120 Finns and friends from coming out and celebrating the summer solstice and nature at the Lake Phalen Pavilion in St. Paul.

Music was the highlight throughout the day. Admirers of Finnish and Finnish American folk music may recognize many of the artists who played and danced in the sweltering heat. First to play was *Lauluaika*, formed out of a shared commitment to learn, preserve, and teach Finnish and Finnish American folk music—specifically music played at dances in the old Finn Halls. Also, performing singer and kantele player Diane Jarvi joined by Sheila Coughlin, Kyle Gray Young's upbeat songs in Finnish; and Karen Ba introduced us to *Runolaulu*, also known as rune singing, which refers to an ancient form of oral poetry. The Kisarit Dancers proved they had Sisu when they danced two sets for their followers.

The intent was to have a traditional Juhannus celebration, like what takes place in Finland. So, there was a sauna brought in for the occasion. Even though it was 96 degrees outside, a few hardy souls sat in the sauna and got even hotter.

Makkara was sold and other Finnish treats like freshly baked *munkki*, *lettu* made onsite topped with





strawberries and whipped cream, a sweet and tart refreshing raspberry rhubarb punch, and *Paulig Juhla Mokka* coffee.

What made this event special was the community of Finnish organizations that came together to plan the event. Early in the year, musicians Ralph Tuttila and Lotta Kiuru-Ribar imagined a combined Juhannus event with many organizations in our own city. The planning committee included a member from each Finnish group, including *Lauluaika*, *Kisarit Dancers*, *Finnish American Association—Twin Cities*, *Finnish Genealogy Group of Minnesota*, *Finnish American Chamber of Commerce*, *Finnish Honorary Consul*, and *Minnesota Finnish Language School Suomi Koulu*. Most groups also put together an interesting package for a silent auction. The funds raised paid for this year's expenses and will give us a start in planning 2026.

FinnFest is now in its third year of a five-year run in scenic Duluth, Minnesota—meaning only two more chances remain to enjoy this vibrant celebration (2026 and 2027) in a city nestled near many Finnish-American communities in Minnesota, Wisconsin and Michigan.

FinnFest is more than a festival—it's a four-day immersive cultural experience that welcomes both Finns and non-Finns alike with open arms. The Finnish people are proud to share their rich heritage, and the festival is a showcase of everything from crafts and design to contemporary art, music and dance and thought-provoking discussions.

The website was well organized, offering many (150) choices. Whether you're watching a live musical performance, or learning about weaving, or hearing about current events, there's something for everyone.

Shop Finnish goods and services at the *Tori* (Finnish Market):

- Sauna supplies, and even a sauna
- Finnish art, clothing and foods (to include *Salmiakki*)
- Nordic walking sticks
- Salolampi Language courses offered in Bemidji

You'll also find a cafeteria filled with a variety of Scandinavian dishes to try such as salmon soup (my favorite).

Cultural Classes and Experiences:

This year, I even learned how to make and clean my Finnish *Ryijy* in a weaving class. One session was about moving to Finland and building a life in Tapiö—just a few examples of the workshops and sessions available.

Unique Finnish Sports:

One of the festival's surprises was hobby horsing, a competitive sport in Finland that blends fun and creativity. I also explored *Asahi*, a gentle fitness practice suitable for all ages and abilities, requiring no equipment—ideal for wellness enthusiasts.

Special Guests and Presentations:

Children and families were thrilled by the appearance of the Moomins, Finland's beloved cartoon characters. There was a Marimekko fashion show. Anyone wearing the iconic fashion could take a walk on the runway in the finale.

A major highlight was the presence of Leena-Kaisa Mikkola, the Finnish Ambassador to the U.S., who spoke

on Finland's journey, especially in light of its recent NATO membership. She shared how Finland's global reputation for happiness stems from values like inclusiveness and contentment.

A particularly thought-provoking session focused on Christian Nationalism in the U.S., compared with Christianity in Finland.

Don't miss your chance to join this joyful gathering in Duluth in 2026. With just two more years to go, make sure FinnFest is on your 2026 and/or 2027 calendar. Whether you're reconnecting with your Finnish roots or just curious to explore, you'll leave with memories—and maybe even a sauna bucket—in hand.

Finnish Connection: Finnish Ambassador's Cousin

It is mid-April 2024. I open my email inbox to find a message from FinnFest USA's President of the Board to announce Finland's new ambassador to the United States. Before I even open the message, I am thinking: *Wouldn't it be something if the appointee is my third cousin?* Sure enough—Leena-Kaisa Mikkola has been appointed and began her ambassadorship effective on September 1, 2024.

She comes to the post as a well-seasoned career foreign diplomat—having served in similar capacities to Israel, Africa, the Middle East and, most recently, China. And she is my third cousin. I reply-all on the email to thank FinnFest's president for the announcement and to inform the board that the ambassador is my third cousin. No kidding. And then I email the ambassador to congratulate her and to extend an early invitation to speak at FinnFest 2025 in Duluth.

The Finnish-American connection in the Lumppio family from which the ambassador and I descend began with Ambassador Mikkola's uncle and her first cousins visiting Minnesota in the mid-1970s. Over the next five decades, several descendants in this Lumppio family line have crossed the Atlantic—Finns to America and Americans to Finland—to nurture relationships and to meet new relatives. Each trip extended the family circles known in the homeland and the new land.

When my family first visited Finland in 1980, we were so excited to meet relatives descended from ancestors who remained in Finland while ours had emigrated to the U.S. around the turn of the 20th century. What surprised us was that our Finnish relatives were just as interested in meeting us and learning about our lives as descendants of their ancestors who'd come to the United States.

Some of the most enduring memories of my three trips to Finland are visiting the birthplaces of my great-grandparents. Worshipping in the church where my great-grandmother was baptized and confirmed invoked an extremely powerful sense of place. It is what impelled me to plan a gathering of about 40 family members the day after FinnFest—to welcome the Ambassador back to Minnesota and to renew our shared connections between Finland and America.

The Finnish-American connection runs through family lines and extends into each generation. It is no coincidence that family histories are recorded as trees—our roots nourished by relationships to grow strong, to branch out, and to flourish through generations.
